I would also like to make a plea to parents/carers of learners who cycle to and from school. It may be 'uncool' to some learners, but it is important for them to wear a helmet. We can provide a secure storage space available in school should this be required. A national newspaper has reported on a major study of bike helmet use around the world from more than 64,000 cyclists and found that helmets reduce the risks of a serious head injury by nearly 70%. The study also found neck injuries are not associated with helmet use and cyclists who wear helmets reduce their chance of a fatal head injury by 65%. With the amount of traffic on our roads nowadays, this is something that I would respectfully ask all parents and carers to address with their children. We have already spoken to learners about this in school earlier this year. As we all know, helmets don't guarantee safety but they do provide added protection. The event was opened by the Leader of Newport City Council, Councillor Debbie Wilcox, who provided the year 11 learners with a motivational speech about their future careers.

This was followed by a demonstration of the new infographic where the learners heard about future job trends, what jobs will have the most vacancies, and what industries are growing.

A feature of the infographic is a quiz that highlights the many different and varied career opportunities that are available in South East Wales. Year 11 learners took part in this quiz and were shocked by the answers. This quiz is the starting point for all learners to consider when thinking about their future careers.

Finally representatives from the NHS made a presentation on the different types of careers that are available in the NHS. This ranged from the obvious such as doctors and nurses to less obvious such as car mechanics. The learners were surprised to find out that the NHS is the fourth largest employer of people in the world.

University Day for 'A' Level Science Learners

When the invitation came for 'A' level Science learners to attend a day at the University of South Wales Science campus, Treforest, approximately a dozen budding scientists jumped at the opportunity to experience higher education!

There were two courses on offer: Forensic, and Pharmaceutical Science.



Included in the day for those interested in forensic science, was a visit to the crime scene house where, suited up appropriately, our learners were able to look for evidence from several different 'scenes of crime'. They were also able to investigate blood spatters to calculate, amongst other things, where the suspect had been standing when using a weapon to commit a crime. This necessitated the use of trigonometry and other advanced maths skills!

Those taking part in the

pharmaceutical science day were able to complete a

hands on laboratory investigation about which indigestion remedy was the best value. In addition they were able to make a hand cream to take home.

All learners were given a tour of the Science Campus and were given a chance to ask current students about university life. All in all, a great day and one which left all of our learners thinking about their future studies at university and beyond.



Chemistry at Work Event for Year 9 Learners



Thirty of our Year 9 learners mainly those who had selected to study triple science in KS4 were lucky enough to be given the opportunity to visit the University of South Wales for a chemistry at work day.

Supported by See Science & First Campus as well as the university, our learners took part in three different workshops designed to give budding scientists an insight into the applications of chemistry in the world of work.

Learners had the opportunity to meet a variety of chemists working in this sector and to try a selection of hands on activities.



Workshops were delivered by specialised staff, all PhD qualified from local universities.

The first workshop was entitled chemistry in the 3rd Dimension where learners wore 3D glasses to 'step inside' a variety of chemical systems. This included looking at the difference between diamond & graphite and at an anti-cancer drug.

The second workshop was a practical session held in the university science labs where our learners wore white coats and safety glasses to undertake experiments involving the extraction of colour from vegetables to check freshness followed by an analysis of a substance using thin layer chromatography.

The final workshop was a session on fluorescence in life sciences where our learners found out about the role of fluorescent chemical compounds in healthcare.

Dylan, 9PD said 'The trip was incredible from start to finish and really opened my eyes to the opportunities that would be available to me at university. I enjoyed every minute and am now determined to study engineering in the future.'

This was a great day thoroughly enjoyed by all involved and if given the opportunity again an experience we will surely repeat!

Sports Day



On Friday 13th July, we had our annual sports day at Lliswerry High school which ran throughout the day and was another huge success. Learners from all year groups took part with a total of around 160 competitors representing their houses: Ebbw, Severn, Usk and Wye.

The morning sessions saw all of the field event competitions; high jump, long jump, shot putt, javelin, discus as well as track events 200m, 800m, egg and spoon and sack races. At the mid-way point of the day, Wye house, who were the defending champions, took a narrow lead from Usk. After an early lunch, the whole school took to the field to see all the afternoons' events and cheer on their houses in the 100m, relay, and tug of war events. The afternoon was also an opportunity for staff to compete in a few events; 100m, egg and spoon, sack race, and the relay.





The overall winners of the House Cup were Wye house who managed to retain the trophy by beating Usk house (2nd place) by 30 points. Ebbw house finished in 3rd place and Severn house finished 4th.

- A. Go to learner reception and the staff there will help you.

- Q. Who can give me permission to go home if I am unwell?
- A. Your Head of Year or Head of Key Stage or a Senior Member of Staff
