#### Dear parents and carers,



I'm sure it's fair to say that we are all well and truly fed up with the impact of the coronavirus pandemic on all aspects of our lives and I know that sadly, some of our families have suffered greatly as a result of it. As we look towards the New Year I await, with a mixture of anticipated relief and trepidation, the announcement of how qualifications will be assessed and awarded this year. All of our learners have missed so much school during the full lockdown and as a result of further self-isolations this year. Therefore, it is vital that whatever system Welsh Government puts in place must be considerate of this and ensure that there is a 'level playing field' for all learners across Wales. We will, of course, ensure that our learners are prepared as best as possible once we know the details of how the exams process will look this year.

Both will be repeated at a second time point a few months later.



## ACCELERATED READER



Throughout the Autumn term, our Key Stage 3 classes have been using Accelerated Reader. The purpose of this is to improve the reading ability of all learners and to encourage and nurture a love of reading.

Accelerated Reader is a computer programme that helps teachers manage and monitor learner's independent reading practice. The learner picks a book at his/her own level and reads it at his/her own pace. When finished, they take a short quiz on a computer – passing the quiz is an indication that the pupil has understood what has been read. Learners should be aiming for a score of 80%+ in quizzes in order to make *accelerated* improvements in their reading. In order to secure success, learners are encouraged to read for at least 15- 20 minutes every day and complete each book within 3 weeks before completing the quiz within 24 hours of finishing their book. Parents can also help with this by monitoring their child's progress and asking them about their reading. We will then share the progress made throughout the school year.

Our collective total at the moment is 15,436, 946 with learners in year 7, 8 and 9 reading over 840 books!

We are very much looking forward to seeing how much this will support **all** of our learners across the curriculum and hope that you support us in this initiative. What is more, **if you would like to donate any previously used or unwanted books** suitable for learners between 7 and 16 years old, we would love to find them a new home and a new lease of life in our school library. Books of all shapes, sizes, genres and interests will be gladly received and should be handed in to the school reception or the school library.

## **ASPIRE PROJECT**

The students on the Aspire project took part in the South Wales fire Service youth project – Phoenix Project. They really enjoyed the Project where they learnt all about the Fire and Rescue Service. The students got a good understanding of who the fire service are, what they do and how they engage with people within the communities they serve.

It was a very interactive experience for young people and with the help of the friendly trainers, the students learnt the job of a real firefighter through taking part in a range of activities, which included:



- Using ladders correctly
- How to roll out the hoses, using the hoses correctly including how to spray water
- How to complete parade and a full drill of what a fire fighter does when there is a fire.
- Learning search and rescue techniques in a dark house environment
- Car safety
- · Becoming familiar with how the fire truck works
- Team building games.





The trainers demonstrated their parade to the students, which the students would replicate at the start of every day in their full kits.

The students completed a handbook, which asked questions and reiterated what they had learnt during the week. This then allowed them to gain a Level 1 qualification in Firefighting.

This is the Aspire's 4<sup>th</sup> year doing the Phoenix project where we usually visit the fire station at Malpas to complete the course but due to the current restrictions with Covid-19 this was not possible so they made it possible to run

the course on our grounds at Newport East Community Centre in Moorland.

This was new to the phoenix project as well as us but it ran seamlessly. The course was well thought out and as interactive and engaging as it has been the past 3 years. Everything that is normally done during the phoenix week was also done this week despite being away from the station. Nothing was an issue and this year's group got the exact same experience as the previous years. Even with regards to the search and rescue activity, the staff managed to make the experience the same the young people thoroughly enjoyed the week.

## **YOUNG CARERS**

A young carer is someone under 18 who helps look after someone in their family, or a friend, who is ill, disabled or misuses drugs or alcohol.

- Support to make ambitious plans for the future and achieve them.
- Recognition of their legal rights to assessment and support.

## COMIC RELIEF CHROMEBOOKS DONATED TO LLISWERRY HIGH SCHOOL



Lliswerry High School is one of three Newport High Schools who are working in partnership with Newport Uskmouth Rotary Club. The Rotary Club have been able to donate 7 brand new Chromebooks thanks to a grant funded by Comic Relief.

The Rotary 'Laptops 4 Home Learning' project is also working to re-cycle refurbished laptops which are then passed on to those pupils who are digitally disadvantaged. The project has a target of meeting the needs of pupils who are currently without a reliable means of getting access to their online education from home.



The laptops donated so far come from members of the public and from a variety of businesses. When collected, they are upgraded by a local IT company, Micro-smith.co.uk, where Mike and his team access, repair, and convert the donated laptops. All this work is generously carried out free of charge.

Our Headteacher, Mr Davies, said "The school are delighted to receive the Chromebooks kindly donated by Newport Uskmouth Rotary. The equipment will have a significant impact improving disadvantaged students' access, and their engagement in, learning at home." The project hopes to continue to refurbish a steady stream of donated laptops and to pass them on to the pupils of Lliswerry High School over the coming months.



Anne Jackson Bass, Rotary project leader said "We hope that this project is helping to ensure that all pupils are able to get on-line from home so that they can continue their academic progress in these difficult times".

We are now using <u>Schoolgateway</u>, which allows us to communicate with parents quickly and cost effectively via email, text or smartphone. It will also allow us to send electronic reports in future.



Using Schoolgateway will enable us to send you app messages (avoiding the cost of texts) and you can send messages back for FREE. It's quick and easy to use.

All you need to access Schoolgateway is your email address and mobile number that we hold on record for you. If you have trouble logging in, please contact the school. If you have a smartphone, you can help us save money by downloading the 'School gateway' app from your app store (Android and iPhone).



All communication from the school will be sent via Schoolgateway.



## **MEDICAL ROOM**

We have a small medical room which is managed by a first aid officer. Learners visiting the medical room will be assessed and a decision on the next course of action will be made by the first aid officer, i.e. learner receives treatment, a phone call home is made or returns to class. Learners should familiarise themselves with the protocol below before visiting the medical room:

#### Learners:

- Q. What should I do if I feel unwell in a lesson?
- A. Tell your subject teacher and he/she will give you a red exit slip to leave the classroom to go to the medical room in learner reception.
- Q. What should I do if I feel unwell at break time or lunchtime?
- A. Go to learner reception and the staff there will help you.
- Q. If I feel unwell during the changeover of lessons, what should I do?
- A. You must report to your next lesson and speak to your subject teacher.
- Q. Should I contact my parents and ask to be collected?
- A. No, the staff on learner reception will contact home if you need to be sent home. Reminder: You should not use your mobile phone whilst in the school building unless you are in one of the designated areas during lunch or break time.
- Q. Who can give me permission to go home if I am unwell?
- A. Your Head of Year or Head of Key Stage or a Senior Member of Staff

#### Parents:

We have recently had a number of parents called to school by their children without the staff having any knowledge of a learner feeling unwell. Parents are asked for their support in the process above and to wait for the school to contact them to collect their child.


## PARENT GOVERNOR VACANCY
