Dear Parents, Carers and Learners,

Firstly, I wanted to thank you all for your support and understanding throughout this academic year. This is a phrase I've used quite often in my communications to you, but please don't underestimate the difference your support and understanding have played in easing the burdens of what has been an exceptional and very challenging school year.

We have just been issued with operational guidance from Welsh Government about arrangements for schools from September. I will write separately about this in more detail before the end of term. It would appear that whole year groups self-isolating as 'close contacts' will no longer be in place. However, one of the key issues that remains to be decided by the Government is how the TTP (Test, Trace, Protect, also known as Track and Trace) staff will coordinate the identification of learners who will need to self-isolate following a positive case being reported to school. The other thing to stress is that the guidance is issued for the Covid-19 situation as it currently stands. There may be further changes announced by Welsh Government between now and the start of September which could affect the plans we are currently putting in place. Of course, we will keep you updated on any changes should they happen.

We are also awaiting confirmation of how GCSE and A Level grades will be awarded next year. The suggestion currently is that it will be 'business as usual' – back to how things were pre-pandemic, but again this it still to be confirmed. So much still to be decided, but rest assured that we will be ready to welcome and support our learners back into school in September and throughout the year as always.


Whilst every learner deserves lots of credit for the way they have adapted this year, I would like to give a special mention to all those who have been awarded their GCSE, AS and A level grades via the Centre Determined Grades process. Essentially, in all schools it was a process of teach-test, teach-test over a prolonged period of time and our learners coped admirably with the challenges this presented to them. Very well done to them all!

I would also like to pay tribute to all of the staff and members of the Governing Body of Lliswerry High School. For a myriad of reasons this has been the toughest year in my teaching career. Throughout everything, our staff and Governors have never wavered from going above and beyond to ensure that learner wellbeing was paramount throughout the pandemic, whilst also supporting them to continue their academic progress.

On the topic of school staff, we have a couple of very notable departures this September. Mrs Harris (Welsh) is retiring after 21 years of service to Lliswerry High School and Mr Thomas (maths and Assistant Headteacher) is retiring after an incredible 39 years of service to generations of Lliswerry learners. I'm sure many of our parents will have been taught by Mrs Harris or Mr Thomas at some point in the past! We wish them both long and very happy retirements.

I'm sure that many parents and carers will be purchasing new uniform items in readiness for September, so I would like to draw your attention to the uniform information below once again. Please ensure that any uniform item bought meets our school uniform policy. **Our uniform policy hasn't changed** - tight trousers, leggings, short skirts (no more than 7cm above the knee) or any

footwear other than plain black are not acceptable – whatever your child may say! If in doubt, or if you have financial difficulties in relation to uniform purchase, please do contact us. As a guide, please see the images below. Please remember that from September our normal uniform expectations will apply. Please see more detailed uniform information on the next page.



Jewellery – in the interests of health and safety, only one small stud earring in each ear lobe is allowed. Please note that facial piercings are not acceptable. We advise that expensive watches or expensive stud earrings are not worn to school.

We expect and value high standards and your support of this with regard to uniform and jewellery is much appreciated. **Year 11 parents/carers** – if you have any unwanted uniform items, we would be very pleased to receive them from you. This would enable us to support some of our families who are facing significant financial hardship. Please drop any items off at main reception or get in touch with us and we will collect them.

As we now look towards the next academic year my main hope, as mentioned above, is that throughout the year we are able to avoid the incredibly frustrating periods of lockdown and year group isolations we have experienced this year. Only time will tell if that is possible of course. What I can assure you all is that whatever comes our way, we will be prepared and ready to do what is needed to support all of our learners as we move forward.

I hope you all have a safe and enjoyable summer break. Finally, embodying my mantra to learners of making every day a positive attitude day, I look forward to September with enthusiasm and optimism.

Aspire Graffiti Wall Project





The COVID-19 pandemic has hit everyone in so many different ways. The young people, who attend the Lliswerry Aspire Project at Newport East Community Centre, Moorland Park, designed the memorial wall to mark the worldwide pandemic. The Aspire project is an alternative education programme for young people aged 14-16 who attend Lliswerry High School.

The young people have missed many opportunities that are normally available when they attend the Aspire project due to pandemic so staff members wanted to ensure that the young people were able to gain alternative opportunities.

Working in collaboration, the Youth Workers – Holly Manfield and Lucy Rogers who run the project, worked together with the Community Development Worker for the Community – Vicky Walters. Vicky was able to secure a grant and funding from the Legacy funding bid to make the project happen.

The group all worked together with the Graffiti Artist – Silent Hobo to complete the project. They were consulted and involved in every stage of the project. They were involved in the planning, concept, design and implementation. This then gave them ownership and pride in their work, their building and their project.



The young people used this work as evidence for one of the qualifications that they have completed this year and this was great to see the young people getting involved in something that will be in the community for many years to come. When we were first planning the community project that we going to choose, the group wanted to do something to remember COVID. They wanted to remember the time that the community in which they live came in together. The young people thoroughly enjoyed the whole process. They are extremely proud of the amazing work that they have produced.

New to English Transition Project





The ability of a group of people to do remarkable things hinges on how well those people can pull together. We build our Transition projects for pupils who are new to English on the foundation stones of community, unity and fun to ensure that we develop a sense of safety, self- confidence, belonging, mutual respect and care for each other in our learners.

Our NTE transition project has been running for the last 4 years and it helps learners to form relationships, reduces anxiety, and develops stronger self-esteem

whilst encouraging self-expression through creative arts and various fun activities.

In the past, learners have been cooking together, visited the school, played football, taken on

various fun challenges and participated in number of creative projects together. However, this year was different. The new rules and regulations enforced on us due to the pandemic made things harder, but we were not willing to give up on our project and wanted to make sure that this year's new cohort could benefit from the same opportunities when it comes to transition.

Via online live sessions in collaboration with Maindee Primary School, St Andrew's Primary School, Pillgwenlly Primary School and



Lliswerry Primary School, we took on a creative challenge this year. We were honoured to be supported by hip hop artist Toby G MBE and his amazing wife Jo Gorniak. We felt inspired by Toby's live journey and Jo's poem called SEE ME that is about a child who cries out for help, love, and care and pleads to belong somewhere. Learners created their own poems, dances and rap using Jo's lines: *Don't judge me for...I want you to know that I am...*

Toby and Jo are true community champions who believe in a sense of unity, peace, love, respect and fun and most importantly champion every young person who enters their circle.

Refillable Water Bottles for Lliswerry Learners

After fundraising for some considerable time, we are delighted to inform you that we have now purchased refillable water bottles for all KS3 learners. The bottles hold 750ml of water and are, as such, plenty big enough to keep our learners hydrated during the school day.

There will be filling points at various locations around the school including in both canteens.

The bottles will be free of charge to learners and distributed during form time at the start of autumn term (September).

Learners will be asked to sign on receipt of their bottle, they will identify their bottle with a permanent marker and write their initials on the base.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of the learners who are too numerous to mention, who have been involved in the fundraising for this initiative. They have all received a Headteacher's

Commendation certificate, positive points on their class chart accounts as well as a refillable pen made entirely out of plastic bottles and a pencil made out of newspaper.

I would also like to thank Liz Burden at Asda, Pillgwenlly for all of her help and support in arranging for our learners to pack bags at the store as the amounts raised there allowed us reach our target.

Physics Mentoring Project

During June and July a number of our Year 10 students have been online with two university project mentors, Hanna Strojecka a second year undergraduate studying Physics and Cosmology at Swansea University and Oliver Page a first year studying Physics at Aberyswyth University. The students have engaged with the mentors exploring potential jobs that use Physics in some way. This has been enlightening for our learners as it identifies just how omnipresent physics is our everyday life and careers.

Biometrics

The school is now using a Biometric payment system for catering, which is a quicker and easier way for learners to purchase food/drinks from the school canteen.

If you wish to register your son/daughter for this system, forms are available from the school reception. Once we have received the completed form learners will be registered the same day. This is a more efficient way for them to get their lunch instead of them remembering a 4 digit code.

Period Dignity

Newport City Council is currently running a Period Dignity campaign which seeks to ensure that noone misses out on education due to their period. As part of this campaign Newport City Council has provided secondary schools across Newport with a free sanitary product vending machine and to ensure that the project provides environmentally friendly options, non-applicator tampons and reusable menstrual cups are also available. These products are free of charge and available to all learners in Newport schools. Products are available in the girls changing room and pupil reception.

Contact Details

Please make sure we have your most up to date contact details, also that you don't have the school number blocked. During this academic year we struggled to make contact with a few parents when making calls home. Please also note that if we call, it may show on your phone as 'number withheld'.

Learner Support

At Lliswerry High we want to create an outstanding climate for learning. It is important that our learners feel happy and supported in order to achieve their best in the classroom.

Our Pastoral team consists of both teaching and non-teaching staff who are available to offer support and guidance to learners in an effective and timely manner. As such we would ask that you emphasise with your child that they should approach a member of staff in the first instance should a problem or issue arise, rather than contacting home. By giving staff an opportunity to resolve any concerns we will be able to reduce any unnecessary worry for both you and your son / daughter.

Medical Room

We have a small medical room which is managed by a first aid officer. Learners visiting the medical room will be assessed and a decision on the next course of action will be made by the first aid officer, i.e. learner receives treatment, a phone call home is made or returns to class. Learners should familiarise themselves with the protocol below before visiting the medical room:

Learners:

- Q. What should I do if I feel unwell in a lesson?
- A. Tell your teacher and he/she will give you a red exit slip to leave the classroom to go to the medical room in learner reception.
- Q. What should I do if I feel unwell at break time or lunchtime? (If the bell goes for the start of the lesson, you must go to your lesson and speak to your teacher.)
- A. Go to learner reception and the staff there will help you.
- Q. Should I contact my parents and ask to be collected?
- A. No, the staff on learner reception will contact home if you need to be sent home. Reminder: You should not use your mobile phone whilst in the school building unless you are in one of the designated areas during lunch or break time.
- Q. Who can give me permission to go home if I am unwell?
- A. Your Head of Year or Head of Key Stage or a Senior Member of Staff

Parents:

We have recently had a number of parents called to school by their children without the staff having any knowledge of a learner feeling unwell. Parents are asked for their support in the process above and to wait for the school to contact them to collect their child.

Reminder Covid-19

Please note the following reminders before returning to school in September:

Your child must not attend school if they:

- Feel unwell with any of the identified COVID-19 symptoms (please see symptoms listed below). They should remain at home and **self-isolate** and arrange a **COVID-19 test**
- Have tested positive for COVID-19
- Live in a household with someone who has symptoms of, or has tested positive for COVID-19
- Have been advised by NHS Wales Test Trace Protect (TTP) to do so
- Are required to self-isolate for travel-related reasons

The main symptoms of coronavirus are:

- a high temperature: this means you feel hot to touch on your chest or back (you do not need to measure your temperature)
- a new, continuous cough: this means coughing a lot for more than an hour, or 3 or more coughing episodes in 24 hours (if you usually have a cough, it may be worse than usual)
- a loss or change to your sense of smell or taste: this means you've noticed you cannot smell or taste anything, or things smell or taste different to normal

Please inform us immediately (<u>admin@lliswerryhigh.org</u> at any time or 01633 277867 during the school day):

- If your child is self-isolating for any reason
- If your child has symptoms of coronavirus
- If your child has tested positive for coronavirus
- If you child has been tested and the result is negative
- If someone in your child's household has coronavirus symptoms or has tested positive
