Choosing your learning pathway Dewis eich Llwybr Dysgu

For the first time you have the opportunity to shape your learning pathway for years 10 and 11. There are some choices that you will need to make and this booklet will guide you through the process. It will introduce you to new subjects alongside those you are already familiar with.

Your learning pathway will include:

- Compulsory core subjects English Language and Literature, Mathematics, Science, Religious Studies, Welsh and the Skills Challenge Certificate
- Statutory lessons in Physical Education and Personal, Social and Health Education
- A broad and balanced range of other subjects that you choose to suit your abilities and that you need for your future

Option courses

One-year course: These can be started at the beginning or end of Year 10 or 11. Learners in both year groups will share this option block and have 10 lessons per fortnight. The course is completed and a grade awarded at the end of one year.

Two-year course: Learners are allocated this course at the start of Year 10 and study this subject for two years with 5 lessons per fortnight. The course will be completed and a grade awarded at the end of Year 11.



Study this booklet carefully as it contains the answers to the questions you may have. You can also watch again the subject videos on the Google Classroom. Don't forget you can also ask your form tutor, subject teachers, Head of Year and Head of Key Stage. You may wish to speak to the Careers Advisor – just let your Head of Year know if you would like an appointment.

The most important thing is to consider the following:

- Do gather as much information as you can about the subjects on offer in Years 10 and 11. Make an informed decision – even subjects you have already been studying may have significant differences in Key Stage 4 to Key Stage 3.
- Do consider the subjects you will enjoy and are good at, as these are the ones that are most likely to bring you future success
- Do not pick a subject because your friend has chosen it this is a common mistake! This is about learning, not socialising and the two do not mix well in the classroom when it comes to achieving success with your qualifications.



Do not pick a subject because you like the teacher currently teaching it – they may not be teaching it next year or may not be teaching it to your class next year. Remember – you are picking the subject, not the teacher.

Qualification Information

Qualification: GCSE Exam Board: WJEC

Course outline

You will be involved in producing personal art work relating to a broad theme which is set as the starting point. You will study different artists/cultures and use a range of techniques, processes and media. You can work in 2D and 3D media, using clay, plaster, collage, painting and drawing medias, and develop your creative skills and ideas. You will be learning and practising drawing from observation to aid your research and ideas.

How will I be assessed?

Coursework: A portfolio of work produced over the duration of the course which is 60% of the total mark.

Examination: 9 weeks preparation and ten hours practical exam over 2 days which is 40% of the total marks.

What skills do I need?

A good Key Stage 3 level in Art, interest and a willingness to work hard to further develop your skills and ideas. You must be organised and be prepared to work at lunchtimes and/or at home.

Career Opportunities & Progression

AS and 'A' level Art and Design in the Sixth Form.

BTEC higher levels at college.

DRAMA Drama

Qualification Information

Qualification: GCSE Exam Board: WJEC

Course outline

Drama is more than learning to act; it is essentially a life-skill. The subject allows for personal and social development, fosters creative and imaginative thought and helps to prepare you for adult life. It provides an opportunity for the individual to increase their confidence, in particular the ability to communicate verbally and non-verbally.

How will I be assessed?

The course consists of a range of practical work, the study of selected plays and the consideration of the development of theatre and dramatic techniques. In addition, learners will visit theatres and view appropriate film and television plays, in order to develop an understanding and appreciation of performance.

Practical work 40% Acting: Devising Project / 20% Acting: Performing a text
 Written exam 40% (Exam paper comprises of a set text: Interpreting Theatre + Theatre Review of a production)

What skills do I need?

Learners must be willing to perform in front of others and learn lines. Learners should enjoy reading plays and participating in group activities.

Career Opportunities & Progression

This course will allow progression onto the AS Level Performing Arts/Drama courses, with careers in drama schools, acting, teaching, stage management, drama therapy all possible.

ELECTRONICS Electronig

Qualification Information

Qualification: GCSE Exam Board: Eduquas

Course outline

Electronics is a practical based subject where the practical skills will be developed alongside the theory. The subject will be explored in a variety of contexts – home, school, leisure, community, business and industry. Pupils will study:

- Component 1 Discovering Electronics
- Component 2 Application of Electronics
- Component 3 Electronic System Project
- A project which will include designing, testing, building and writing a report to solve a chosen problem.

How will I be assessed?

Component 1: Discovering Electronics
Written examination, 1 hour 30 minutes, 40% of qualification
Component 2: Application of Electronics
Written examination, 1 hour 30 minutes, 40% of qualification
Component 3: Extended system design and realisation task
Non-exam assessment, 20% of qualification

What skills do I need?

Learners should have good mathematical skills, be good at problem solving, enjoy working with others and have good ICT and communication skills.

Career Opportunities & Progression

This course should interest learners who are intending to pursue a career in electronics or engineering as well as those who wish to further their careers in the sciences where they will meet many electronics systems.

This course will allow progression into Electronics, Engineering and Design Technology.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE Saesneg laith

Qualification Information: Compulsory subject

Qualification: GCSE

Exam Board: WJEC

Course outline

English is a compulsory subject and is fundamental to success in other subjects.

The course enables learners to:

- (i) develop their understanding of the spoken word and their capacity to participate effectively in a variety of speaking and listening activities, matching style and response to audience and purpose;
- (ii) develop their ability to read, understand, enjoy and respond to all types of text; recognise the ways in which writers achieve their effects; develop information retrieval strategies for the purposes of study;
- (iii) develop their ability to construct and convey meaning in written language using appropriate grammar and standard English (except in contexts where non-standard forms are needed for literary purposes), matching style to audience and purpose.

How will I be assessed?

Unit 1: Speaking and Listening Assessment (20%) Individual presentation (10%)

Group discussion: Responding and interacting (10%)

Unit 2 (40%): External Assessment (1hr exam)

Reading (40 marks / 50%) Writing (40 marks / 50%)

Unit 3 (40%): External Assessment (1hr exam)

Reading (40 marks / 50%) Writing (40 marks / 50%)

What skills do I need?

In lessons you will be reading a wide range of text including those from literature and the media and respond to them through discussion and writing. You will also produce your own texts: leaflets, letters, articles and stories. You will be able to explore the criteria for gaining marks before you do so. You will need to be willing to communicate in speech and writing, be interested in society and human responses and be able to analyse literary and media texts.

Career Opportunities & Progression

After studying this course you could go on to study English at AS and 'A' level. If you don't wish to do this, English will still help you in all other subjects, particularly essay-based ones like History and with life practicalities, for example writing letters, completing forms, etc. Many college courses desire English and all universities require it for entry onto any course. English Language opens doors to careers in engineering, finance and medicine; however, your developed skillset will be particularly applicable to the fields of journalism, advertising/marketing, publishing, law and education.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE Llenyddiaeth Saesneg

Qualification Information: Compulsory subject

Qualification: GCSE

Exam Board: WJEC

Course outline

English Literature is the study of influential Literature texts and is fundamental to success in other subjects.

How will I be assessed?

Unit 1 (35%): External Assessment (2hr exam) 'Of Mice and Men' extract and choice of 2 essays (30 marks) Poetry comparison (20 marks) Unit 2 (40%): External Assessment (2hr exam) 'An Inspector Calls' extract and choice of 2 essays (30 marks) 'Heroes' extract and choice of 2 essays. (30 marks)

Unit 3: Controlled Assessment (25%)

Shakespeare (12.5%) Poetry comparison (12.5%)

What skills do I need?

The course enables pupils to develop an understanding of human responses to their world and to enhance the experience of reading for pleasure. During the lessons you will be reading and discussing novels, plays and poems, alone and in comparison, and developing understanding and analytical skills through writing sophisticated responses.

Career Opportunities & Progression

After studying this course, you could go on to study English at AS and 'A' level. If you don't wish to do this, English will still help you in all other subjects, particularly essay-based ones like History and with life practicalities, for example writing letters, completing forms, etc. Many college courses desire English and all universities require it for entry onto any course. English Literature opens doors to careers in engineering, finance and medicine; however, your developed skillset will be particularly applicable to the fields of journalism, advertising/marketing, publishing, law and education.

FOOD AND NUTRITION Bwyd a Maeth

Qualification Information

Qualification: GCSE Exam Board: WJEC

Course outline

The GCSE in Food and Nutrition offers an opportunity to further develop practical skills. You will develop your creative abilities and problem-solving skills, experiment with food investigations and develop your own recipes. You will learn the aspects of good hygiene and safety practices in practical lessons. The course develops an understanding of the food production in industry; the processes and equipment and calculating the nutritional information.

How will I be assessed?

There are two controlled assessments and one examination.

Unit 1 Written examination: 1.5 hours 40% of qualification

NEA 1

Food investigation: approximately 10 hours 20% of qualification

NEA 2

Food preparation: approximately 15 hours including a 3 hour practical 40% of qualification

What skills do I need?

You need the ability to plan and be organised and have an enthusiasm for cooking.

Career Opportunities & Progression

Catering courses can be followed at post 16 Education. The course is also suitable for a range of careers in the food industry such as Food Technologist and in the Hospitality and Catering sector.

FRENCH Ffrangeg

Qualification Information

Qualification: GCSE

Exam Board: WJEC

Course outline

The study of a modern foreign language will broaden your horizons, develop cultural knowledge and understanding and foster transferable skills such as confidence, communication, problem solving and creativity. A GCSE in a modern foreign language will also provide you with a solid foundation for future language study.

The context for learning the language is organised under three broad themes:

- Identity and culture
- Wales and the World areas of interest
- Current and future study and employment

Each broad theme is divided into sub-themes including technology and social media, holidays and tourism and employment.

How will I be assessed?

There are four assessments at GCSE which can be taken at either Foundation or Higher Tier. Each assessment is worth 25% of the qualification. A combination of tiers can be taken.

Unit 1 is an oral test with three tasks (role play, photo card discussion and a conversation). Unit 2 is a listening exam (written) lasting 35 or 45 minutes, depending on the tier. The exam will involve responding to different types of spoken language including conversations, interviews and announcements. Some of the responses will be in the assessed language.

Unit 3 is a reading exam (written) lasting 1 hour or 1 hour 15 minutes depending on the tier. The exam will involve responding to different types of written language including advertisements, newspaper articles, emails and letters. There is also a short translation from the assessed language into English. Unit 4 is a writing exam (written) lasting 1 hour 15 minutes (Foundation Tier) and 1 hour 30 minutes (Higher Tier). This will involve writing three pieces of text for Foundation Tier, for example completing a form, writing an email or a message and writing an article for a magazine. The fourth task will be a translation of sentences from English into French. At Higher Tier, the exam will involve two tasks such as writing an article for a magazine and a website. The third task will be a translation of a short passage from English into French.

What skills do I need?

Listening, Speaking, Reading, Writing

Career Opportunities & Progression

Studying a modern foreign language can lead to many different careers that directly require the use of languages such as translating, interpreting and teaching, but can also open the door to an array of career paths such as journalism, international aid/ development work, marketing, sales and logistics.

GEOGRAPHY Daeryddiaeth

Qualification Information

Qualification: GCSE Exam Board: WJEC

Course outline

Learners study a wide range of topics. Physical Geography topics include tectonic hazards, rivers, coasts, climate change, weather and eco-systems. Human Geography topics include population, rural/urban studies and contrasting development across the world.

An important focus is the study of the connections between human and physical processes. Learners will be given the opportunity to develop their geographical skills through two fieldwork enquiries where we will go out of the classroom and investigate the real world.

How will I be assessed?

80% Exam - There are two exam papers which take 1hr 30mins to complete and are each worth 40% of the overall grade.

20% Non-Examination Assessment (NEA) - This involves going out of school to develop geographical skills through two fieldwork enquiries. Learners will then write up their findings in a portfolio and take this into an NEA task.

What skills do I need?

Geographers requires a wide range of skills including:

- Good written and verbal communication
- Numeracy skills
- Digital skills
- Effective problem solving
- Team work

Career Opportunities & Progression

Geography helps learners develop a range of transferable skills applicable to many careers and for this reason the subject is attractive to a broad range of future employers. There is an obvious progression to AS Geography and Travel and Tourism Courses. Geography also bridges the arts and the sciences giving flexibility for higher education courses. Possible careers include teaching, armed forces, logistics, meteorologist, town planner, tourism officer to name but a few.

Course outline

The qualification enables learners to develop and demonstrate their knowledge, skills and understanding within the context of health and social care, and childcare. The following issues are included in the specification:

- human growth, development and well-being
- promoting and maintaining health and well-being
- health and social care, and childcare in the 21st century
- promoting and supporting health and well-being to achieve positive outcomes

How will I be assessed?

Unit 1: Human growth, development and well-being:

There will be a written examination in the summer which is worth 40% of your overall grade.

Unit 2: Promoting and maintaining health and well-being:

You will need to complete two non-examination assessment (NEA) tasks which are worth 60% of your overall grade.

Task 1: Service Provision

Task 2: Health Promotion

What skills do I need?

Good communication and written skills.

Career Opportunities & Progression

This specification provides a coherent, satisfying and worthwhile course of study for you even if you do not progress to further study in this subject. It provides a suitable foundation for the study of Health and Social Care and Childcare at AS or A level, in addition to providing a suitable foundation for a range of Level 2 or Level 3 qualifications within the Health and Social Care and Childcare suite. It will also help you make informed decisions about a wide range of career pathways. It has been designed to include contemporary issues in relation to the provision of an ethical and sustainable health and social care and childcare system in Wales, and to enable you to make informed decisions about further learning opportunities or continuing into related career choices.

Qualification Information

Qualification: GCSE Exam Board: WJEC

Course outline

The subject content at GCSE enables you to investigate a broad and rich range of options drawn from different periods and diverse societies in the past. Learners can investigate, analyse and evaluate historical figures and events.

NEA (Non examined source work assessment completed in class) on Jack the Ripper

- Unit 1 Depression, War and Recovery in Wales and Britain
- Unit 2 The USA, a Nation of Contrasts 1910-29

Unit 3 – Medicine Through Time

How will I be assessed?

80% Exam - There are three exam papers, one on each of the units outlined above.

20% Non-Examination Assessment - This involves looking at a variety of historical sources and analysing their content and validity. Historical skills are taught in class prior to completing the non – examined assessment.

What skills do I need?

- Good writing and communication
- Ability to make judgements
- Commitment to independent study
- Source evaluation skills

Career Opportunities & Progression

GCSE History provides a suitable foundation for the study of history or a wide range of other academic subjects at A level which in turn can lead to a variety of university degree courses. It provides crucial knowledge of the past as well as developing a broad range of transferable skills to help you understand your place in the world and find your path in the world of further education and work. Possible careers include law, accountancy, journalism, marketing, teaching, police, film making, politics, museum curator or archaeologist.

MATHEMATICS Mathemateg

Qualification Information: Compulsory subject

Course: Mathematics and Numeracy Qualification: GCSE Exam Board: WJEC

Course outline

Students will follow a differentiated scheme of learning with a linear three tier point of examination entry: **Tier Grades Available**

Higher	A* - C
Intermediate	B - E
Foundation	D - G

All tiers offer opportunities to develop knowledge, skills and understanding of Mathematics and concepts including Number, Algebra, Geometry, Measures, Problem-Solving, Statistics and Probability. In addition, the questions in the separate GCSE Numeracy qualification will all be set in real-life situations.

These qualifications encourage students to develop confidence in, and a positive attitude towards, mathematics and to recognise the importance of mathematics in their own lives and to society. The qualifications prepare students to make informed decisions about the use of technology, the management of money, further learning opportunities and career choices.

How will I be assessed?

All learners work towards written externally assessed examinations consisting of two equally weighted papers for each qualification. Unit 1 is non-calculator and Unit 2 allows use of a calculator.

Learners will be entered for examinations in May/June at the tier that best meets their ability.

Learners may be entered at a different tier of entry for the GCSE Numeracy and GCSE Mathematics courses to ensure they achieve the best grade they are able to in each subject.

For some learners who find Numeracy challenging, we are able to offer and entry level qualification in Numeracy instead of GCSE. This consists of three written end of stage tests (in class) over the two years and one final written exam.

What skills do I need?

Literacy – Reading, oracy and writing skills.

Numeracy - Number, algebra, geometry, measures, problem-solving, statistics and probability skills. Digital – Producing and researching.

Career Opportunities & Progression

In the sixth form we offer an A level Mathematics course which is desirable for almost any course you would wish to study at university. Careers in Mathematics include accountant, astronomer, financial trader, game designer, meteorologist, software engineer, software tester, sound engineer, statistician and primary or secondary school teacher.

MUSIC Music

Qualification Information

Qualification: GCSE Exam Board: WJEC

Course outline

This course will give you an opportunity to pursue your enjoyment of music through a variety of activities while enabling you to gain a qualification in a practical yet academic subject that is highly regarded by employers. You will be rehearsing solo and ensemble performances, listening to and discussing a wide range of music from pop to film music and composing your own pieces using digital technology.

How will I be assessed?

Performance (35%) – Two pieces, one ensemble, plus either a solo or another ensemble (30%). Programme note giving details of one of the performance pieces (5%).

Composition (35%) – Two compositions, one in response to a brief set by the Exam Board (30%). Evaluation of the piece composed to the brief (5%).

Appraising (30%) – A listening exam based on prepared and unprepared musical extracts set by the Exam Board.

The Performance and Composition work will be assessed by the subject teacher and moderated by the exam board during the Spring Term. The Appraising exam will take place in the Summer Term. What skills do I need?

You should have an interest in Music. Some experience in performance is helpful but not essential.

Career Opportunities & Progression

Many people who take music do not necessarily go on to become professional musicians but find the wider skills studied in the course useful in future careers from law to medicine. Studies have also shown that those who study music also achieve more highly in other areas such as Numeracy and Literacy.

How will I be assessed?

A good Key Stage 3 level in Art and Design and willingness to work hard to further develop skills. Be organised and be prepared to work at home. All equipment will be supplied.

Qualification: GCSE Exam Board: WJEC

Course outline

This GCSE in Design and Technology offers a unique opportunity in the curriculum for you to identify and solve real world problems by designing and making products. Through studying GCSE Product Design, you will be prepared to participate confidently and successfully in an increasingly technological world; and be aware of, and learn from, wider influences within the field of design.

How will I be assessed?

Two controlled assessments.

Unit 1 - Design and Technology in the 21st Century

Written examination: 2 hours 50% of qualification

Unit 2: Design and make task

Non-exam assessment: approximately 35 hours 50% of qualification

What skills do I need?

You need the ability to draw and some competence in making. Also, a knowledge of Computer Aided Design is preferable. However, you do not need to be particularly artistic, just enthusiastic to learn new skills and a determination to be the best you can.

Career Opportunities & Progression

Further studies at A Level in Product Design and Fashion Design. Work within the design industry including architecture, industrial design, sports design and furniture design.

RELIGIOUS STUDIES Astudiaethau Crefyddol

Qualification Information: Compulsory subject

Qualification: GCSE Exam Board: WJEC

Course outline

The GCSE Religious Studies specification provides opportunities for learners to follow a course that is coherent and that balances knowledge of core beliefs, teachings and practices in the two religions of Christianity and Buddhism, with an understanding of how they can be applied to philosophical and ethical themes.

The specification will:

- develop learners' knowledge and understanding of religions and non-religious beliefs, such as atheism and humanism
- develop learners' knowledge and understanding of religious beliefs, teachings, practices, and sources of wisdom and authority.
- develop learners' ability to construct well-argued, well-informed, balanced and structured written arguments.
- provide opportunities for learners to engage with questions of belief, value, meaning, purpose, truth, and their influence on human life
- challenge learners to reflect on and develop their own values, beliefs and attitudes in the light of what they have learnt.
- provide learners with the opportunity to study Welsh perspectives, which arise naturally from the subject matter.

How will I be assessed?

There is one 2-hour examination taken at the end of year 11.

What skills do I need?

Course outline

GCSE Science (Double Award) involves the study of all three sciences. This includes Chemistry, Biology and Physics and will result in **2 GCSE grades** at the end of Year 11. The course will develop your understanding of many areas of science and also develop your practical and problem-solving skills.

How will I be assessed?

Assessment is via 6 exams; 2 each for Biology, Chemistry and Physics, plus 10% for practical skills. Learners sit the 1st 3 exams at the end of Year 10 and the remaining 3 at the end of Year 11. Assessment of practical skills is carried out in Year 11 under controlled conditions and is externally marked by the exam board; this is 10% of the final mark.

Learners will follow a differentiated scheme of work with a linear two tier point of examination entry:

Tier	Grades Available
Higher	A*/A – E/E
Foundation	B/C – G/G

Learners will be entered for examinations in May/June at the tier that best meets their attainment.

This is a fast paced, intensive course so a love of Science is essential! If you hope to study Science based A-Levels, you need to cover more material than the Double Science course contains. Triple Science follows on from Double Science and extend the basics so you have a wider understanding of Chemistry, Biology and Physics.

As with Double Science there will be practical sessions, written exercises and the opportunity to work on group presentations and take part in discussions. Topics include:

- Genes and how they make us different from one another
- How do we get our drinking water?
- How are cars designed to keep us safe?
- Smart Materials

How will I be assessed?

10% of the mark is from an assessed practical exam. Learners need to use their results to draw a graph, write a conclusion and suggest improvements. The task is carried out and written up under controlled conditions in school.

The remaining 90% is assessed by 6 written papers (1hr45), 3 of which will be taken in June of Year 10 and 3 in Year 11.

In Triple Award Science the grade awarded for each science is **independent** of the others.

All learners will study a full Welsh GCSE course over 2 years. Learners will learn to speak Welsh spontaneously on 3 topic areas; Youth, Wales and Employment, be able to read every day stimuli and write letters, job applications and reviews. The course will enable learners to understand and use the language for a variety of purposes and audiences, develop language learning skills and strategies in order to communicate and interact confidently and spontaneously in relevant situations, use Welsh in further studies, in the workplace and in their communities and to develop curiosity about the Welsh language.

How will I be assessed?

This qualification has two external assessment units which are weighted equally and two internal assessment units. The two external assessment units test reading and writing skills while the two internal assessment units test oral and listening skills.
